PARTIES TO DISPUTE:

(Elgin, Joliet and Eastern Railway Company

STATEMENT OF CLAIM: Claim of the System Committee of the Brotherhood (GL-9437)that:

1. Carrier violated the effective Clerks' Agreement when it failed to allow Clerk G. Lepper fifteen (15) days' pay as sick leave allowance at the rate of her former position AC-923, Senior Timekeeper, for the period of January 2 through January 22, 1980.

2. Carrier shall now be required to pay Clerk G. Lepper (her estate) fifteen (15)days' pay assickleave allowance for the period of January 2 through January 22, 1980.

on September 18, 1979, claimant began an extended leave due to illness. She was never able to return to her position as a Senior Timekeeper and she passed away on February 11, 1980. Claimant had been employed by the Carrier for more than ten years. The Organization brings this claim, on her behalf and on behalf of her estate, for fifteen days of sickleave pay covering the fifteen work days in the period from January 2, 1980 through January 22, 1980.

Rule 56(a) of the applicable agreement which controls this dispute states:

- "(a) Employes covered by this agreement shall be allowed sick leave with pay during each calendar year as follows:
- one (1) year and less than ten (10) years, ten (10) workingdays.
- 2. Employes who on January 1st have been in service ten (10) years of (sic) over, fifteen (15) working days." (Emphasis added.)

The organization contends that under prior awards interpreting Rule 56 on this property, claimant was entitled to sick Leave pay for the first fifteen workingdays in 1980 even though she never actually performed work during 1980. See Third Division Awards No. 21478 (Eischen); No. 22914 (Kasher). The Carrier contends the claimant was not an employe, within the meaning of Rule 56, during 1980 because she never returned to her assigned position after September 18, 1979. Also, the Carrier contends that there is no Language in Rule 56 which provides for disbursement of sick leave pay to the estate! of a former employe.

During the period from January 2, 1980 through January 22, 1980, claimant was in the service and an employe of the Carrier. Since she had more than ten years of service, she accrusda righttoreceive sick leave pay beginning on January 2, 1980. Third Division Award No. 22194 (Kasher). Her claim forsick pay is not cancelled merely because she never returned to work during 1980 since shehadanabsolute right to receive the fifteen days of pay as of January 22, 1980.

Similarly, claimant's right to a sick leave allowance did not expire upon herdeath. The Carrier has cited agreements on other properties which specifically provide for payment of accrued but unused sick leave pay to the estate or beneficiary of adeceased employe. While we question the relevance of these other agreements, we note that the sections cited by the Carrier concern the employer's obligations upon the death of an employe. None of the provisions address the issue of paying money to an employe's estate where the employe gained a right to receive payment while still living.

We will, therefore, compel the Carrier to pay the claimant 's estate fifteen days of sick leave pay for the period from January 2, 1980 through January 22, 1980.

FINDINGS: The Third Division of the Adjustment Board, upon the whole record and all the evidence, finds and holds:

That the parties waived oral hearing;

That the Carrier and the Employes involved in this dispute are respectively Carrier and Employes within the meaning of the Railway Labor Act, as approved June 21, 1934;

That this **Division** of the Adjustment Board has **jurisdiction** over the dispute **involved herein; and**

That the Agreement was violated.

AWARD

Claim sustained.
